We Beat Our Goal



After the payouts to our football grand champion, and a few fees to the GoFundMe site, our Passionist Sisters across the border have received over \$19,000!


MISSION STATISTICS



The Race Began on December 10, 2021

It was December 10, on a national launch via Zoom, that Bob Duffield shot off the starting pistol in front of the San Diego Mission. Fourteen alumni walked, ran, or bicycled 552 miles in their hometowns as their progress was completed on a virtual pilgrimage from San Diego to Agua Prieta. These alumni and their friends raised half our goal with \$7,632 by January 26 -- 54 days after the start.

Mike Kruger not only paid all of our website fees, but created the 20+ postcards that described the historic missions we passed and much more.




The Passionist Community at Mater Dolorosa, California, watched our struggle from afar and...


Father Clemente Barron, C.P., called. He couldn't help but notice we were just half way to our goal after completing the virtual race. He said he'd ask his community to make a hefty donation to stimulate us to stay the course to reach our goal. He said he was speaking to his community in Sierra Madre, California. Mistakingly we assumed that the 'community' might be some group of lay folks attached to the Retreat Center. But no! Fr. Clemente was speaking for his own community of vowed Passionists. He said the community had been blessed with these funds over the last year and they loved the idea of contributing it to their counterparts—the Passionist sisters—just across the border. And yes, a few weeks later, a check for \$2,000 was sent.
